This book is not about drafting a pattern from scratch. Unless you have dreams of starting a pattern line it is beyond most home sewers to work up a pattern from measurements. Frankly, we'd rather just get to the sewing part. This book demystifies the "rub-off" technique so that you can take a garment that you already love and fits and make a pattern without destroying the piece of clothing. Many people get frustrated with sewing clothes because of issues of fit, not an inability to put a garment together. Ms. Lincecum shows you how to avoid all of those fitting problems by starting with a garment that fits, making the pattern, and then changing the design details so that you can vary the design but not change the basic fit. She even shows how you can do this with handbags. Imagine, all the patterns you ever need hanging right in you closet! I expect that in a very short time this will be as invaluable to me as my copy of Fit for Real People was when I started sewing.

Pleased but a bit frustrated

I got a copy of this book as a gift and was immediately interested in doing one of the methods outlined in the book. I'm not a professional sewer by any means so I knew I would need to try out one of the methods on a simple garment. I traced a simple blouse without details such as collars, yokes, plackets, darts, pockets, pleats, etc... It worked! And, I was very pleased with the results.

But, when I tried to copy a shirt with darts (a bust dart and vertical or fishtail dart), my results were hideous to say the least! I simply couldn't follow the author's directions (or math) for how to add in the amount taken up by the bust dart. Moreover, the vertical dart completely threw me for a loop! It made me think that maybe this was the problem that one reviewer, Antonio Castillo, was trying to express (???)

For me, a sewer with intermediate skills, this would have been a fantastic book if more direction and examples had been given on darts. The topic of darting just felt a bit rushed in the book. If anyone could explain the darting process for me, I'd be very grateful and could really appreciate all the other great information in this book but for now, just call me FRUSTRATED!
